LIFE IS A TREASURE HUNT: THE ART OF ANTIQUE COLLECTING

History

Tuesdays, September 5, October 10, November 7

2 to 3 p.m.

INSTRUCTOR: Fern Larking Kao, Antique Collector and Sales

COURSE OUTLINE:

September 5: In this session we will explore antique and estate Jewelry & silver and gold sewing accessories from about 1830 to 1960. Fern will share the mechanics of discovering the value of jewelry from different eras, including how to determine carat weight, where pieces originated from and whether they are made of precious metals. Each participant can bring in (1) piece of jewelry or sewing accessories to practice these skills and learn what to look for to find value in items.

October 10: This session will cover ladies Victorian era from 1837-1901 including chatelaines, Posey holders, ladies hem lifters and nanny's brooches. Fern will share the stories on where and why they were first used, and their value if found today. Each participant can bring in (1) item to learn what to look for to find value in items.

November 7: The final session will explore the value of perfume bottles including the rich history of bottles from a local factory Devilbiss, 1920's to 1940's hats and hat pins, and hat pin holders. Each participant can bring one (1) item to learn what to look for to find value in items.

COURSE OUTLINE:

Black Swamp Bird Observatory (BSBO) was founded in 1992 by a group of biologists studying bird migration in the area. Having collected several years of data, they recognized the need for an organization to help disseminate their research findings. BSBO's long-term research projects have helped to develop a greater understanding of bird migration and the habitat needs of songbirds, raptors, shorebirds, and rails. BSBO data has been used to assist both private and governmental land owners in better managing their properties for migratory bird species. The Observatory's education and outreach programs have received national accolades. This session will offer information on why northwest Ohio is such an important location during spring and fall songbird migration as well as the importance of bird habitat, and bird conservation.

Wednesday, September 6:

DNA has quickly become the "gold standard" for forensic evidence. It can damn the guilty, exonerate the innocent, and is generally expected to be present and tested in every case by the lay public. But, what is it and how did DNA rise to such prominence? Are DNA results always reliable or relevant? This session is meant to provide the novice with a basic working knowledge of forensic DNA analysis, including history, current and emerging techniques. Join Dr. Crystal Oechsle for a better understanding of DNA and forensic science. Dr. Oechsle currently is an Assistant Teaching Professor at Bowling Green State University and the Center for the Future of Forensic Science. Dr. Oechsle's curriculum vitae includes work as a hybrid criminalist, DNA analyst and technical leader, crime scene responder, and quality assurance manager.

Tour the Ohio Attorney General's Center for the Future of Forensic Science laboratories. The Center's laboratories conduct forensic science research and support the BGSU Bachelor of Science in Forensic Science and Master of Science in Forensic Science programs. The Center for the Future of Forensic Science is set up similarly to state crime labs that handle and test

evidence. Forensic science is not as it seems on popular tv shows but the tour of the Center for the Future of Forensic Science labs appropriately represents the equipment crime labs currently utilize.

National Hispanic Heritage Month is Friday, September 15, 2023, through Sunday, October 15, 2023. Each year, Americans observe National Hispanic Heritage Month celebrating the histories, culture, and contributions of American citizens with backgrounds from Spain, the Caribbean, Central and South America. This observation started in 1968 as Hispanic Heritage Week under President Lyndon Johnson and was expanded by President Ronald Reagan in 1988 to cover a 30-day period starting on September 15 and ending October 15. It was enacted into law on August 17, 1988, on the approval of Public Law 100-402. September 15 is significant because it is the anniversary of independence for Latin American countries Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua.

COURSE OUTLINE: Structured problem solving is a proven strategy for discovering effective solutions to difficult, complex problems: climate change, reproductive rights, gun violence, and poverty, for example. The method employs teams to create a clear statement of the problem, discover the multiple causes of the problem, formulate and evaluate solutions address those causes, and then implement those solutions effectively. This method eliminates many of the common errors that commonly occur in typical amateur problem-solving: failing to find the actual causes of the problem, choosing attractive but ineffective solutions, and implementing solutions that do not endure the test of time.



The most commons types of procedures that patients pursue during medical tourism trips include elective cosmetic surgery, organ transplantations, cardiac surgery and orthopedic surgery.
