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Glass: From Ancient Craft to Everyday Choice

Science

Wednesdays, September 3 and October 15

1 to 2 p.m.

LOCATION: Wood County Committee on Aging, 140 S. Grove St. Bowling Green

INSTRUCTOR: Bob Maltby, retired glass professional, author of Bob Maltby's Glass Book

COURSE OUTLINE:

Glass is one of the most remarkable materials ever created—naturally formed by the Earth and later mastered by human innovation. In this engaging two-part course, you'll explore both the fascinating history and science behind glass, as well as the practical knowledge that can help you make smarter decisions when buying windows for your home or vehicle.

September 3: The Story of Glass - Nature, Technology, and Innovation

We begin with the origins of glass, from its natural formation to how technology became involved. Learn how glass evolved from hand-crafted artifacts to massive industrial production, including the challenges of working with *viscoelastic* materials and the artistry of blowing 20-foot glass cylinders. We'll also delve into the groundbreaking float glass process—an invention that now produces thousands of tons of flawless glass daily. With insights from the instructor's personal experience in the global glass industry, this session connects the science, history, and beauty of a material we often take for granted.

October 15: Choosing Windows – What Every Consumer Should Know

In the second session, we shift to a practical perspective: what to consider when buying windows for your home or vehicle. Discover the real differences between window types, including coatings that help keep heat in during winter and out during summer, decorative glass options, and how to evaluate quality. We'll also cover what to look for in car windows—from clarity to cracks to distortion—and when it's appropriate to raise concerns.

Bob Maltby is the author of *Bob Maltby's Glass Book*. This is a project 50 years in the making. This book is a personal report about the physics of glass that Bob has learned from his co-workers in the past 53 years. The subject matter is covered in more detail when that subject is where he has had more experience. He has been fortunate enough to have worked in many glass plants, those that made glass by the sheet, plate, and float methods, and in fabricating plants making automotive and architectural products.

The Eightieth Anniversary of the Nuremberg Trials

History

INSTRUCTOR: Geoff Howes, Retired Professor of German Language and Culture, BGSU

COURSE OUTLINE:

In 1945-46, the four victorious Allies of World War II in Europe, the USA, the USSR, the UK, and France, held an international military tribunal at Nuremberg, Germany, to try the surviving leaders of the Nazi movement and the German military on three charges: crimes against peace, crimes against humanity, and war crimes. This class will review the legal foundations, conduct, and outcomes of these historic, controversial trials, including the novel criminal charges, the arguments of the defense, and the controversies around victors' justice.

Exploring BGSU's Biological Learning Lab

Science

Thursday, September 11

LOCATION: Bowling Green State University, Life Sciences Building, N. College Dr.

INSTRUCTOR: Dr. Matthew Partin, Marine Lab Curator & Mason Murphy, Director of Herpetology Lab

COURSE OUTLINE: Join this session to explore the Marine Biology Lab, Herpetology Lab, and The Greenhouse Complex all located on Bowling Green's campus in the Life Sciences building.

The Marine Biology Lab is a 1,500 square-foot facility which contains over 4,000 gallons of seawater in over 60 aquaria. It includes a 500-gallon touch tank and over 2,000 gallons of coral systems, as well as anemones, starfish, sea urchins, snails, crabs, octopus, algae, and a wide variety of freshwater and marine fish.

The Herpetology Lab hosts a collection of over 25 species of native and exotic reptiles and amphibians, including bearded dragons, chameleons, New Caledonian geckos, green tree pythons, Kenyan sand boas, American toads, and an Axolotl. The lab offers up-close-and-personal demonstrations.

Exploring BGSU's Biological Learning Lab (cont.)

Science

The Greenhouse Complex consists of four greenhouses containing research projects and teaching collections. Highlights include a desert area and tropical floor planting, which includes bananas, ferns, cycads, epiphytes, and a variety of orchids. Guided exploration of plants on display illustrate the different adaptations of species to various pollinators, herbivores, and environmental conditions. Another highlight of the greenhouse complex is the aquaponics research area, which focuses on a sustainable farming method that combines aquaculture and hydroponics. This method harnesses the symbiotic relationship between aquatic animals and plants.

COURSE OUTLINE: September 15: Food Label Jargon Explained—Do food labels claiming the product is "reduced," "light," or "low" in specific ingredients leave you puzzled about what that means? Have you ever wondered what the difference is in foods that make these claims compared to the "regular" version of that item? Join this session at the Wood County Committee on Aging to learn tips and tricks for understanding food label claims and participate in a taste test comparison of foods that are commonly available with a variety of "reduced," "light," or "low" options.

September 22: MyPlate on a Real Plate—The USDA promotes following MyPlate recommendations and following nutrition labels for a balanced diet, but how much of each nutrient do you need and what does that look like on a real plate? This interactive demonstration will help you determine your individual protein, fluid, and fiber needs. During this lesson we will also use samples of common foods to show you how to meet your individualized needs using MyPlate and FDA Nutrition Label Guidelines.

COURSE OUTLINE: This offering is a 1-hour tour with a veteran docent, through **The University of Findlay's Mazza Museum** which houses the largest and most diverse collection of picture book art in the world. The Museum is home to more than 20,000 original pieces of artwork from picture books with about 300 on display at any time distributed through six themed galleries. Each illustration in the museum is labeled with basic information and is accompanied by the book that contains the artwork.

For two Wednesdays in September, get a special look inside from someone who worked and socialized there. It's also a chance to meet some of those military men and women who served the President with distinction as they completed a "No-Fail Mission." **About the Book:** The No-Fail Mission. We hear these words, but do we truly understand their meaning? This book, a joint venture between University of Toledo Press and Palmetto Publishing, profiles ten American service members who earned the Presidential

Modern Masters: Mid-Century Jewelry, Ceramics and Glass Art

Tuesday, September 23, Thursday, October 16 and Tuesday, November 11

LOCATION: Wood County Committee on Aging, 140 S. Grove St. Bowling Green

INSTRUCTOR: Fern Larking Kao, Antique Collector and Sales

COURSE OUTLINE: Explore the bold innovation and timeless elegance of mid-20th century design through this three-part class on **Mid-Century Jewelry**, **Mid-Century Ceramics and Mid-Century Glass**. Each session offers a deep dive into the aesthetic, material, and cultural movements that defined the postwar era — from the studio jewelry revolution to the sculptural reinvention of ceramics and glass.

September 23: Bring one piece of jewelry to the class. Discover how artists transformed jewelry from mere adornment into wearable art. Learn about the tools, techniques, and philosophies that redefined jewelry in the mid-century period, with a close look at form, function, and material innovation.

October 16: Bring one piece of ceramics to the class. Mid-century ceramics blurred the line between craft and fine art. From functional stoneware to sculptural vessels, we'll trace how mid-century ceramicists combined ancient traditions with modernist experimentation. This course will examine items from egg cups, to pie birds and rolling pins.

November 11: Bring one piece of glass to the class. From hand-blown studio art to sleek industrial forms, Mid-Century Glass captures the innovation and optimism of the postwar design era. This course explores how glass artists and designers redefined the material through bold experimentation, modernist aesthetics, and new technologies between the 1940s and 1970s. We will examine mixing bowls to Pyrex.

Hunting for Speed: Inside the Sport and Culture of Skeleton Racing

LOCATION: Wood County Committee on Aging, 140 S. Grove St. Bowling Green

INSTRUCTORS: Dr. Montana Miller, Associate Professor, Department of Popular Culture, BGSU

COURSE OUTLINE:

Dr. Montana Miller, who specializes in studies of tradition, belief, and narrative in extreme sport and performance cultures, will take the audience through a descriptive and audio-visual introduction to skeleton racing, one of the "sliding sports" that will soon take place at the 2026 Winter Olympics in Italy. As an athlete herself who has trained with the Canadian Olympic skeleton team, careening head-first down the track at Whistler, British Columbia at 80 mph, Dr. Miller will offer an exclusive inside look at the sliding community along with some insights from a folklorist's perspective regarding why and how people succeed in it despite the brutal nature of the sport. The collaborative narratives created by coach and athletes build a system of beliefs which skeleton racers share and personalize through vernacular sayings, cautionary tales, and rituals surrounding their sleds.

LGBTQ + You Society

COURSE OUTLINE: How to love, respect, & support queer and genderqueer individuals.

This presentation covers LGBTQ+ identity, what to do if someone comes out to you, and current political issues facing the community. The point of the presentation is to branch understanding and answer any questions someone might have regarding queer and trans people. The point isn't to shake the audience and say "LOVE AND RESPECT TRANS PEOPLE," but to explain what it means to be trans. At the end of the day, each member of the audience is going to go home and tune into either CNN or Fox News. Regardless of which they choose, they're going to hear the word "transgender," and have the knowledge of what that word actually means.

Art Tells Stories Arts

COURSE OUTLINE: This program will provide an enriching exploration of art through the lens of thematic analysis and interactive discussions, using works from the rich collection of the Toledo Museum of Art. Sessions will revolve around themes that span diverse cultures, styles, and time periods. Lively conversations will encourage participants to share their own perspective and interpretation and to learn from others. Group activities tailored to each theme will further deepen an appreciation of visual art as a medium for artistic intention and expression. Together, participants will explore how art both reflects and shapes our understanding of the world. No prior art expertise is required—just an open mind and a curiosity to discover the stories that art can tell.

Sharon has been a volunteer museum teacher for 13 years, planning and leading a variety of scheduled tours, now at the master level. Her experience includes using requested themes for K-12 students, for visitors with cognitive and physical disabilities, for special TMA exhibitions and for gallery groups that return several times each year, including BG Third Friday and Women's Club BG visitors.

Through lively discussion, we will investigate American Library Association award-winning picture books including those that won the Caldecott, Schneider, Sibert awards and more. Participants will walk away with a richer understanding of picture books and new titles to share with their loved ones.

Valued or Forgotten: Reexamining Identity, Family, and Truth in a Changing

INSTRUCTORS: Robert Barr, Retired Pastor, Social Worker, Sociology College Instructor

COURSE OUTLINE:

October 9: This session will examine the origins of our values, who is important, value of life and violence and the value of life and social strife through a sociological perspective. Although the issue of abortion focuses on whether the unborn baby is a person and has rights, it totally ignores the fact that the mother is a person and has rights. It also ignores the effect that widespread abortion has had on our communities. This session will use this topic to explore our values.

October 16: This session will examine the development of law, reaching maturity, breakdown of law and it relating to authority. Through a sociological perspective we will explore the rule of law. There are two competing views on law today who are battling for dominance. America prospered while the first was dominant but has suffered greatly since the second has taken over dominance. I explore the effects of the two views of law.

October 23: This session will examine value of family from the biological nature, value of marriage, problems with marriage, what is normal, and gender confusion from a sociological perspective. The family is being dismissed today as no longer important but the family is very important to our society. This session will explore the function of the family and its importance to society.

October 30: This session will examine the value of time, truth and education from a sociological perspective. These three values are often ignored today but are very important to the preservation of values. We will explore them and their importance to us.

November 6: This session will explore the value of you, value of your relationships and your possessions. These three values are often ignored today but are very important to our well-being. We will explore them and their importance to us. This session will strive to expand our perspectives from a sociological view point and explore deeper examinations of todays values based on past constructs.


LOCATION: Bowling Green State University Planetarium, Near the corner of N. College and E. Merry St.

COURSE OUTLINE: Operated by the Department of Physics and Astronomy in the College of Arts and Sciences at Bowling Green State University (BGSU), the University Planetarium is a "theatre of the Universe. It can surround you with an accurate image of the sparkling night sky." Please join Dr. Kate Dellenbusch, Professor and Planetarium Director at BGSU, as she takes you through the presentation of "Undiscovered Worlds: The Search Beyond Our Sun". See how astronomers search for planets around other stars. Discover

the characteristics of some of the first planets to be found orbiting other stars and how these characteristics were surprising to astronomers. Followed by questions and discussion.

The course sheds light on how judges handle conflicts of interest, maintain independence, and make decisions that affect people's lives.



The Life Science Building and Planetarium are located off of Thurstin and Merry Street.

Visitor parking is in lots 7B, 7C, and 7D. You can pay for parking in the lot either by kiosk or on your phone (see page 15 for details) These are the orange lots circled on the map to the left. You will have to walk a short distance after parking to arrive at the Life Sciences Building, which is labeled on the map. The Planetarium is located directly east of the Life Sciences Building.



Fall Semester 2025 Maps


Mazza Museum

Fall Semester 2025 BGSU Parking


Pay at a Kiosk

Visitors may use the Pay & Display kiosks in various locations throughout campus. Kiosks take cash, coin or credit card at the rate of \$1 per hour. Please note that the kiosks are unable to distribute change, so please use exact amount.

Pay on Your Phone

Visitors may access the PayByPhone mobile app (search PayByPhone in your app store to download it) to pay for short term parking designated by signage in campus lots. We recommend downloading the app ahead of arriving at the parking lot. Parking rates are the same as for the kiosks, but with a processing fee per transaction. Users will receive an alert when the parking time is about to run out, giving them the opportunity to purchase additional time from their phone instead of returning to a kiosk.
